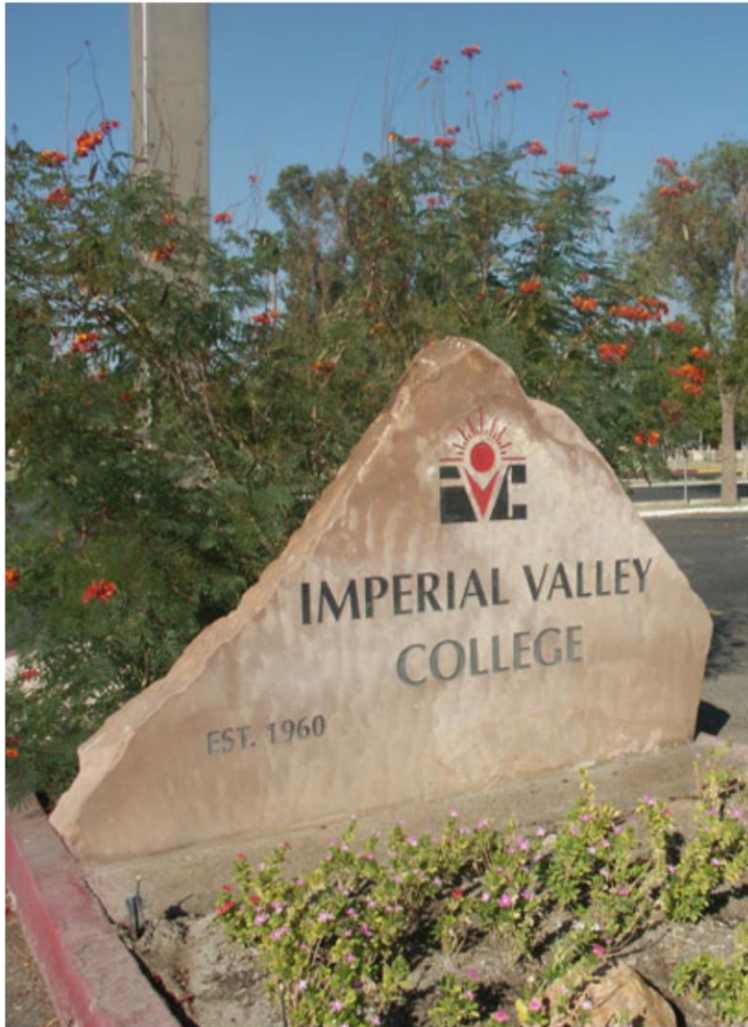

A college should embrace diversity in all its forms

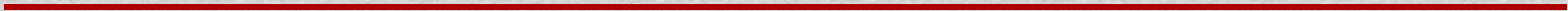
A college should strive for innovation and creativity

Why Transformative Education?

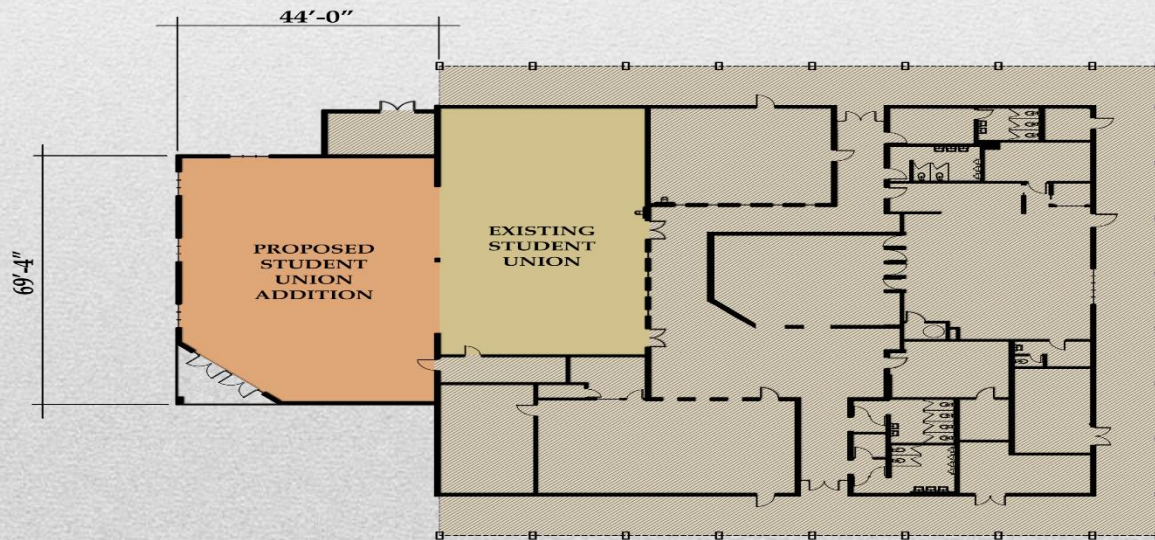


Recent Institutional Successes

- Achieved about an 8% growth last academic year
- Completion numbers increased approximately 10% last year in comparison to the previous year. In June we held the largest commencement ceremony in the history of the college
- IVC was awarded a 2.5 million dollar Innovation Grant to enhance tutoring services
- The college was awarded 1 million dollars through Workforce Development in Economically Distressed Communities funding to create a Correctional Academy and a full-time Medical Assistant Program
- Became a Peace Office Standards and Training (POST) certified Police Academy
- Increased partnerships with four-year universities
- Recognized as one of colleges offering best practices to Food and Housing Insecure students

Future IVC Projects

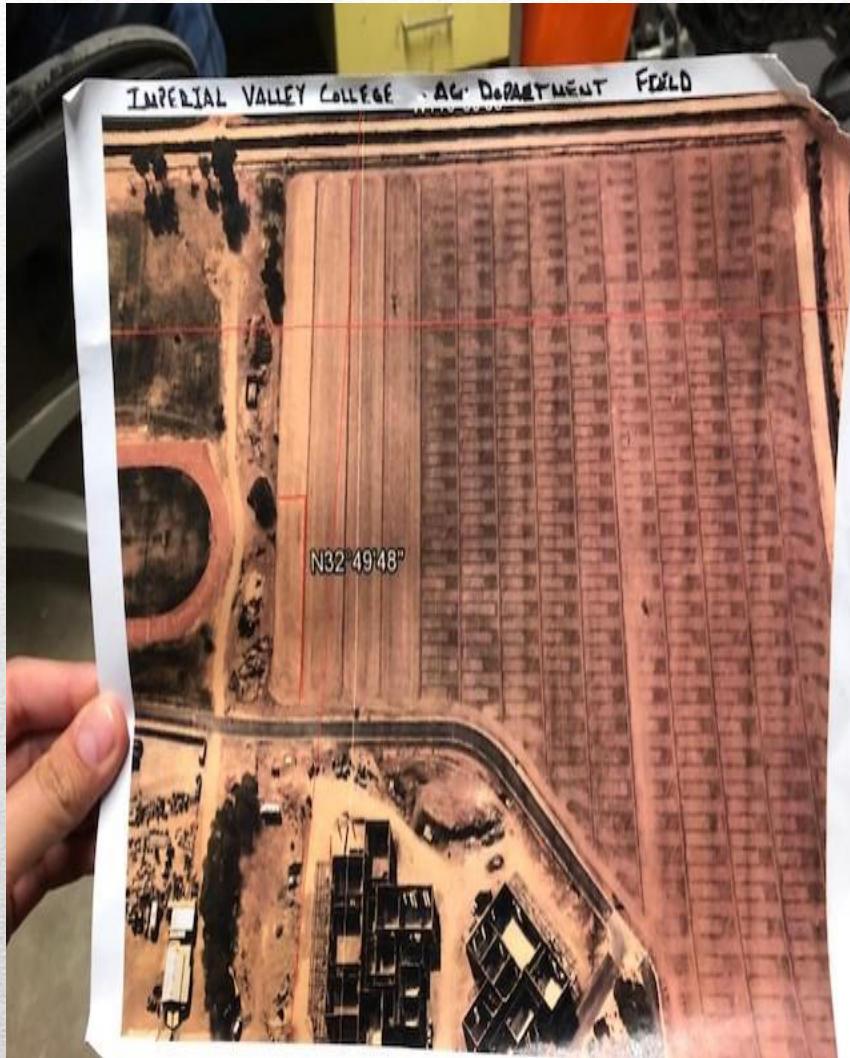
- Expand the College Center; will add over 3,000 square feet to that building
- Renovate buildings 200, 300, 800, 1100, 1200, and 1300
- Expand Allied Health/Nursing Facilities
- Build the Learning Services Building
